COVID-19 latest

<u>Please note face masks continue to be required in all indoor public settings in the City of Boston.</u> This requires everyone over the age of two to wear a mask or face covering at indoor public places such as businesses, clubs, restaurants and bars, retail outlets, performance venues, gyms, event spaces and municipal buildings.

Vaccine & Booster Update

Please note children ages 5 to 17 are now eligible to get the Pfizer vaccine. Boston Public Health Commission and Boston Public Schools are providing FREE vaccine clinics to anyone ages 5 and above. You can check upcoming vaccine clinics on their calendar here: http://bostonpublicschools.org/vaccines

People ages 18 and older who are unvaccinated can get any vaccine. Boosters are also available for anyone ages 18 and above who have received the 2-dose

Pfizer or Moderna for at least 6 months, or the single-dose J&J for at least 2 months. If you are unsure whether you are eligible for a booster or which booster to get, the State website provides more information here: https://www.mass.gov/covid-19-vaccine

Hearings Recently Held



Hearing to discuss services for women veterans

We held an informative meeting to discuss how veteran organizations and Veterans Administration (VA) hospitals can offer more gender-specific services for our women veterans. Women comprise nearly 20% of serving military personnel and 10% of the veteran population, making up an important part of our military. However, despite their contributions, women veterans often don't receive enough support. This was reflected in the testimony and statements from panelists in the hearing, who spoke about their experiences in the military or with women veterans, and how discrimination and prejudice still follows women veterans and women veterans of color whether they are in or out of the military. Panelists also spoke about the high incidence of Military Sexual Trauma (MST) especially among women veterans, and the need for services to address this.

Hearing regarding the increase of communications access for people with disabilities to public-facing televisions

I held this hearing in partnership with the Mayor's Commission for Persons with Disabilities and Commissioner Kristen McCosh to discuss ways for the City of Boston to ensure that persons with disabilities have full access to information and resources shared to the public, and that public facing

televisions have closed captions enabled. I will be working with the Disability Commission and advocates to develop policies that will encourage businesses to turn on captions for their televisions, so that our residents with hearing loss and other disabilities can access information also.

Hearing to discuss water rescue infrastructure in the City of Boston

Boston is a city surrounded by water, and over the years with the increase of visitors and tourists to our city, we unfortunately see incidents of people falling into the water. As a result, residents have advocated for life saving rings to be installed at Fort Point and near public docks in case of accidents and other incidents of people falling into the water. This hearing brought together city and state agencies to discuss existing infrastructure in place for rescuing those that fall into the water, as well as talk about ways that we can further improve water safety. Thank you to the YMCA for working with the City of Boston in providing swimming lessons for our youth.

Upcoming Hearings

Hearing to discuss internet access and digital equity in the City of Boston

On Monday, December 6th at 11am, I will hold a hearing on Digital Equity with Councilor Julia Mejia and Councilor Kenzie Bok. The COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated the Digital Divide for many of our neighbors, communities of color, immigrants, and our seniors. We will discuss the lack of affordable internet and access, competition, municipal broadband and infrastructure at the hearing.

Hearing regarding the installation of solar panels on municipal parking lots and buildings, investing in electric vehicle charging infrastructure, and electrifying the City of Boston's vehicle fleet

On Friday, December 10th at 11am, Councilor Matt O'Malley and I will hold a hearing regarding Electrical Vehicle (EV) infrastructure and electrifying the City's vehicle fleet. With bipartisan federal legislation now signed which includes funds for EV charging, proposed legislation that includes increased tax credits, and car companies shifting to EVs in the coming decade, it is critical to discuss infrastructure at new construction developments, municipal locations, street parking and commercial areas.

Hearing regarding maximizing workforce development opportunities in biotechnology for Boston residents

We will be having this hearing with Councilors Baker, Breadon, Bok, and Mejia on how we can ensure that Boston residents will have access the jobs in the biotechnology sector, especially as this is a growing industry in our city. This hearing will take place on Monday, December 13th at 10am via Zoom.
