Over the past two months, the City Council has been working hard in reviewing and amending the FY2023 budget. Since mid-April, the Council has conducted 30 Ways & Means Budget hearings on the City's departmental budget and capital projects.

At last week's Council Meeting, we approved a \$1.3 billion budget for the Boston Public Schools. This funding will be an important step towards delivering the much-needed investments in our children, our schools and facilities. The City Council has also submitted amendments to the Operating Budget to add more funding on areas such as pest control, pedestrian safety, small businesses, and other issues impacting our city, and the Mayor will soon return with an Operating Budget with modifications for our approval. We will also have the final vote on the Capital Budget by the end of the month.

June is Pride Month. After a two year hiatus, I am delighted to see so many Pride events and activities take place around the City once again. I was proud to join my City and Council colleagues at the Pride Kickoff at City Hall Plaza earlier this month. Boston celebrates and stands committed to equity and equality for our LGBTQ+ community. You can show your support to our LGBTQ neighbors by attending the many events planned in partnership with the City. Happy Pride!

COVID-19 latest & testing

According to the Boston Public Health Commission, there has been a 11.1% increase in COVID-19 cases over the past two weeks and community positivity is at 9.3%. If you are feeling unwell, please get tested and wear a mask. The BPHC provides free testing in the City. Please visit <u>boston.gov/covid19-testing</u> for available testing sites. I encourage those of you who are not vaccinated or boosted to receive your shots. Vaccines will reduce your risk of COVID-19 infection, and prevent severe illness, and hospitalization.

Vaccine & Booster latest

Children ages 5 to 17 are eligible to get the COVID-19 vaccine. Children ages 5 to 17 who completed their primary COVID-19 vaccination series for at least 5 months can also get a booster. Please note those aged 5-11 can only get a Pfizer booster. Second boosters are also now available for those who are ages 50 or older and anyone immunocompromised from the age of 12 and upwards who received their first booster at least 4 months ago.

This law will protect the Historic Beacon Hill District and maintain the rich history of Boston for generations to come.
